Books

Titles related to the field of Psychology will usually begin with the call numbers “BF” and can be found on the 6th floor of Langsam Library.

- You can try a SUBJECT search in the Library Catalog for a specific term related to your topic, for example: *cognition, memory, genetic psychology, intelligence, schizophrenia*
- [PsycBOOKS](#) links you to full text books published by the American Psychology Association and other publishers in the psychology field. You can find [PsycBOOKS](#) by searching the Library Catalog (under QuickLINKS) and choosing the “Electronic Resource.” Once you open the database, type in your specific search terms, such as: schizophrenia

Articles

You'll find these databases helpful as you search for full-text articles or citations relating to topics in psychology.

Psychology and Behavioral Sciences Collection

The Psychology & Behavioral Sciences Collection is a comprehensive database covering topics such as emotional and behavioral characteristics, psychiatry & psychology, mental processes, anthropology, and observational and experimental methods.

Limit search to FULL TEXT

PsycINFO, 1967 to present

PsycINFO is produced by the American Psychological Association and contains citations that PsycINFO has created in electronic form. Although it is very comprehensive, it is sometimes difficult to find online full text, and can be a little tricky to search.
